

PROVISIONAL BALLOTING

What if the address on my ID doesn't match my voter registration?

If you have either 1 form of ID on List 1 OR 2 forms of ID on List 2 and the address does not match your registration you will need to vote a provisional ballot—you WILL NOT have to provide any other ID, nor should you be turned away from voting. If the addresses match, you vote a standard ballot.

What is a regular provisional ballot?

If you have moved or changed your name and not updated your registration, you will be asked to vote a provisional ballot. By filling out the provisional form, your registration will be updated. If the address on your ID does not match the way that you are registered in the Signature Roster, you will vote a provisional ballot (no other ID is necessary). If you requested an Early Ballot and go to the polls on Election Day, you will be asked to vote a provisional ballot. Election officials will check to be sure no one is attempting to vote twice.

You will vote a regular provisional ballot if you show tribal identification under "ID Provisions for American Indians" that do not meet the requirements of voting a regular ballot.

What is a conditional provisional ballot?

If you don't have ID, or have only 1 form of non-photo ID, you will vote a conditional provisional ballot and its processing will be conditional upon **returning with proper ID within 5 days** of federal elections.

Do provisional ballots count?

All voters have the right to vote a provisional ballot. However, the ballots will only count if the voter was eligible, signed the provisional ballot form, and cast the ballot in the correct polling place. Provisional ballots do not count if the voter was not registered, registered after the deadline, was in the wrong polling place, didn't show ID, already voted an early ballot, or if the voter failed to sign the form.

VOTING AT THE POLLS
Know Your Rights

- Voters may bring in someone to assist them in voting as long as they are not a candidate on the ballot, the voter's employer, or an agent of the voter's labor union.
- Voters may also bring in guide animals or assistive devices.
- Language assistance is available at many polling places. Contact your local county elections office to find out if your polling place is covered.
- Alternative formats are available from many counties. These formats include large print, Braille, and audio recordings.
- Each polling place is equipped with a touch screen machine capable of large print and an audio representation of the ballot.
- Special Election Boards are available in some counties for homebound voters. Contact your local office to see if the service is available in your area.
- The polls officially close at 7:00 PM and no new voters may get in line after that time. Everyone in line at 7:00 PM will be given the chance to vote.
- Children are allowed into the polling place with you but should not be allowed to disrupt other voters and must remain respectful in the polling place.

OTHER TIPS WHEN VOTING

- "Rush hour" at the polls occurs the first hour that the polls are open, at lunchtime, and after 5 PM. If you are able to vote mid-morning or mid-afternoon there will be less congestion.
- Be sure you are at the correct polling place so that you don't stand in line unnecessarily.
- Use your sample ballot to pre-mark your choices; bring it with you to the polls and simply transfer your selections to the official ballot once you are in the polling place.
- Update your registration whenever you move so that your information will be correct in the Signature Roster.

VOTING AT THE POLLS
Must Show Proof of Identity

The elector shall present acceptable identification that:

- Bears the name, address, and photograph of the elector (See List 1), or
- Two different forms of identification that bear the name and address of the elector (See List 2), or
- One form of acceptable photo identification with one form of non-photo identification that bears the name and address of the elector (See List 3)

List 1:

- Valid Arizona driver license
- Valid Arizona non-operating identification license
- Tribal enrollment card or other form of tribal identification
- Valid United States federal, state, or local government issued identification
- An identification is "valid" unless it can be determined on its face that it has expired.

List 2 - Two Required

- Utility bill of the elector that is dated within 90 days of the date of the election. A utility bill may be for electric, gas, water, solid waste, sewer, telephone, cellular phone, or cable television
- Bank or credit union statement that is dated within 90 days of the date of the election
- Valid Arizona Vehicle Registration
- Indian census card
- Property tax statement of the elector's residence
- Tribal enrollment card or other form of tribal identification
- Arizona vehicle insurance card
- Recorder's Certificate
- Valid United States federal, state, or local government issued identification, including a voter registration card issued by the County Recorder
- Any mailing to the elector marked "Official Election Material"
- An identification is "valid" unless it can be determined on its face that it has expired.

List 3

- Any valid photo identification from **List 1** in which the address does not reasonably match the precinct register accompanied by a non-photo identification from **List 2** in which the address does reasonably match the precinct register
- U.S. Passport without address and one valid item from **List 2**
- U.S. Military identification without address and one valid item from **List 2**
- An identification is "valid" unless it can be determined on its face that it has expired.

ID PROVISIONS FOR AMERICAN INDIANS

Tribal IDs are an acceptable form of ID to vote at the polls. Depending on the type of tribal ID, another form of ID may be needed. Check with your Tribe or tribal subdivision to see if other forms of ID, other than your tribal enrollment ID, are acceptable to use when voting at the polls. These could include a voter registration card for tribal elections, or a home site assignment lease.

Address	Matches Roster = Standard Ballot But Does NOT Match Roster + ID from List 2 that matches roster = Standard Ballot
No Address	+ ID from List 2 that matches roster = Standard Ballot No other ID = Provisional Ballot <i>(Do not need to return with other ID. Ballot will be counted as long as your are voting in your correct precinct)</i>

Tribal ID without Photo	
Address	Matches Roster + ID from List 2 that matches roster = Standard Ballot
No Address	No other ID = Provisional Ballot <i>(Do not need to return with other ID. Ballot will be counted as long as your are voting in your correct precinct)</i>
